Minnesota Education and Training Voucher (ETV) program

The Education and Training Voucher (ETV) program provides up to \$5,000 per year to pay for post-secondary education at a college, university, vocational, technical, or trade school. ETV funding is a non-competitive grant based on need and availability of funds. The funds do not need to be re-paid.

Who is eligible? You must be under age 26; graduated from high school or received a GED; be accepted at an accredited college, university, vocational, technical or trade school using the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to determine financial aid; have more school expenses than financial aid; and at least one of the following:

- ✔ Experienced foster care for 30 consecutive days at age 17
- ✔ Adopted from foster care at age 16 or older
- ✔ Had transfer of permanent legal and physical custody by the court from foster care at age 16 or older
- ✓ Under state or tribal guardianship, you were in foster care when turning 18, and your parent's parental rights were terminated or suspended.

If a returning ETV student, you must be making progress in completing your education.

What can funds be used for? The funds can be used for the following expenses:

- ✔ School expenses tuition, fees, books, one-time computer purchase and more
- ✓ Housing on or off campus, rent deposit, rent and utilities
- ✔ Food
- ✔ Personal expenses phone, internet, laundry detergent, personal hygiene items and more
- ✔ Transportation between campus, residences, and worksite
- Child care.

You can use ETV funds for five years of post-secondary education.

How do I apply? ETV awards are made beginning July 1.

- ✓ Students attending a <u>Fostering Independence Grant Participating College or University</u> are automatically considered for ETV awards if they answer *yes* on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to the question have you been in foster care at age 13 or older. No ETV application is needed.
- ✓ Students attending a school that is not a Fostering Independence Grant Participating College or University must submit an <u>online application</u> between July 1 and April 1.

Two programs provide post-secondary education funds to current and former foster youth

The <u>Education and Training Voucher Program (ETV)</u> program and the Minnesota <u>Fostering Independence Higher</u> <u>Education Grants</u> program work together to benefit eligible youth. Those eligible for ETVs are also eligible for Fostering Independence Grants. ETV awards are made first, then Fostering Independence Grants. Youth not eligible for ETVs may still be eligible for Fostering Independence Grants.

If a youth applies to a <u>Fostering Independence Grant Participating College or University</u> and answers yes on their Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to the question have you been in foster care at age 13 or older, they are automatically considered for an ETV award and a Fostering Independence Grant. No application is needed. If a youth applies to a school that is not a <u>Fostering Independence Grant Participating College or University</u>, they must submit an <u>ETV application</u> to be considered for an ETV award. They are not eligible for a Fostering Independence Grant.
